In **Uganda**, we strengthened our partnership with the Elgon Foundation for People with Albinism, **consolidating an integrated and sustainable model of care**. Thanks to this joint work, 20 people received life-saving surgical interventions to treat skin cancer – procedures that not only restored their health but also gave them a renewed opportunity for life.

In Malawi, we made strides towards institutional sustainability through agreements with local organisations and the renewal of support from the European Union to consolidate a comprehensive project focused on socio-economic development and gender equality. In Rwanda, we expanded our collaboration with the Health Alert Organization, which will allow us to extend the reach of our programmes for the next two years.

Furthermore, in the **United States**, the **Beyond Suncare Albinism Network** was registered in North Carolina as a new branch of the organisation, dedicated to strengthening our work in social research and implementation science.

Beyond the more than 55,000 personalised sunscreens distributed, the 4,300 people with albinism who received care, and the 800 clinics implemented, this year has reaffirmed that our work is made possible thanks to the trust of those who support us and the resilience of the people with albinism who inspire us every day.

To each of you - and thankfully there are more of you every year - who make this journey possible, I extend my most sincere gratitude.

This report not only reflects what we have achieved, but also our shared vision of a fairer and more inclusive future, where no one is left behind and where health and protection are guaranteed rights for all.

# O Defending rights and guaranteeing health for people with albinism

Our mission is to ensure that people with albinism in Africa can fully exercise their right to health and live free from the risks associated with their condition. To achieve this, we work to remove the barriers that hinder access to healthcare services, dermatological care and sun protection.

Our work includes training healthcare personnel, regular distribution of sunscreen, and implementation of protocols that improve prevention, diagnosis and treatment of skin cancer. But our commitment goes beyond immediate response: we accompany institutions and communities through sustained processes that strengthen capacities and foster local autonomy.

Guaranteeing health also means ensuring safety, autonomy and the possibility of a future. Each intervention represents a step towards a more inclusive and fair system, where no one is left behind.

# Promoting social inclusion and transforming systems

Social inclusion is inseparable from health and protection. That is why our actions go beyond the healthcare field: we work to eradicate stigma and discrimination against people with albinism. We develop awareness campaigns that challenge myths, foster respect and promote the inclusion of people with albinism in community life.

### Transformative cooperation

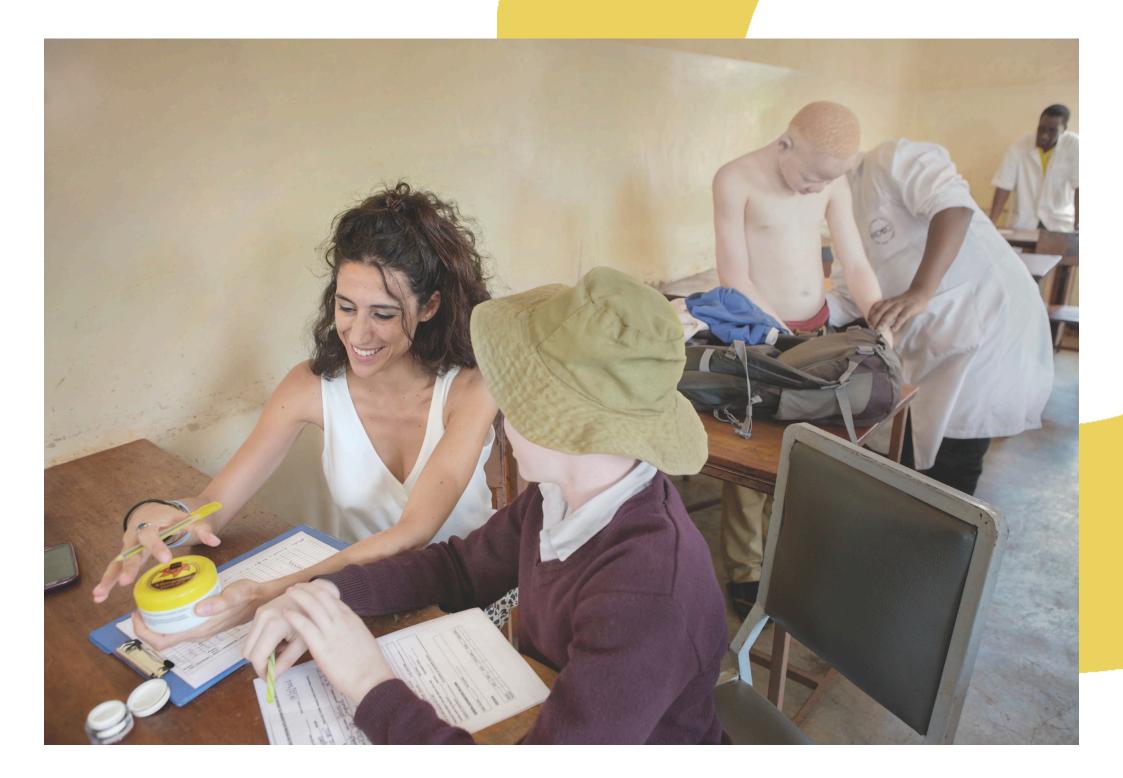

More than 200,000 people with albinism live in Sub-Saharan Africa, where the incidence of skin cancer is extremely high due to a lack of access to information, specialised dermatological care and effective sun protection.

Faced with this reality, Beyond Suncare has developed an integrated, innovative and sustainable approach that combines education on skin cancer prevention, access to specialised healthcare, and community awareness-raising.



# The Challenge

More than 200,000 people with albinism live in Sub-Saharan Africa, many of them in conditions of extreme vulnerability. It is estimated that over 80% of people with albinism die before the age of 30 from skin cancer — a disease that could be prevented with appropriate measures. This alarming figure stems from a lack of access to dermatological services, the absence of suitable sun protection products, and the scarcity of trained healthcare professionals.

Beyond the physical risks caused by prolonged sun exposure without protection, people with albinism face structural discrimination, violence, school dropout, unemployment and social isolation. In many communities, harmful myths, stigma and cultural beliefs persist, making them targets of rejection and systematic abuse. Women and girls, due to their double condition of gender and albinism, experience even greater vulnerability.

These challenges severely restrict access to basic rights and perpetuate a cycle of poverty, fear and inequality that affects people with albinism throughout their lives.

# **The Solution**

Our integrated model acts across three key areas — health, education and inclusion — with interventions tailored to each context and designed to create lasting impact in the lives of people with albinism.

### Prevention of skin cancer

We formulate, produce and distribute SPF 50+ sunscreens adapted to the specific needs of people with albinism, promoting self-care through workshops and direct community engagement.

### Access to specialised healthcare

We train local healthcare personnel to provide continuous dermatological care, thereby strengthening public health systems in rural areas.

### Education, awareness and inclusion

We carry out educational and awareness activities to combat stigma, promote leadership and inclusion, and foster gender equality and human rights.

## **How We Work**

At Beyond Suncare, we work according to a model of horizontal cooperation, based on active listening, community participation and local knowledge. Our approach is developed from the ground up, through continuous dialogue with people with albinism, health professionals and public authorities. We believe in sustainable, rights-based solutions, tailored to each local context. We act where we are most needed.







### **Collaboration and Alliances**

We build strategic partnerships with ministries of health, public hospitals, universities, organisations of people with albinism, and international entities. This collaborative network allows us to maximise impact, share knowledge, strengthen local capacity, and ensure the long-term sustainability of our work.

### **Education**

We train healthcare professionals, teachers, community leaders and families of people with albinism through theoretical and practical workshops on health and self-care. believe in transformative We education that empowers communities, raises awareness and dismantle long-standing helps myths in the societies where we work.

### **Awareness**

We run campaigns in schools, communities and local media to combat stigma, reduce discrimination and make the rights of people with albinism visible. Awareness-raising is key to building safer, more inclusive and cohesive environments.





### **Adapted Sun Protection**

We develop and distribute SPF 50+ sunscreens, specifically formulated for the needs of people with albinism in Africa. Alongside the sunscreen, we provide educational materials and promote self-care practices, teaching communities how to use the product correctly and helping to reduce the risk of future skin cancer.

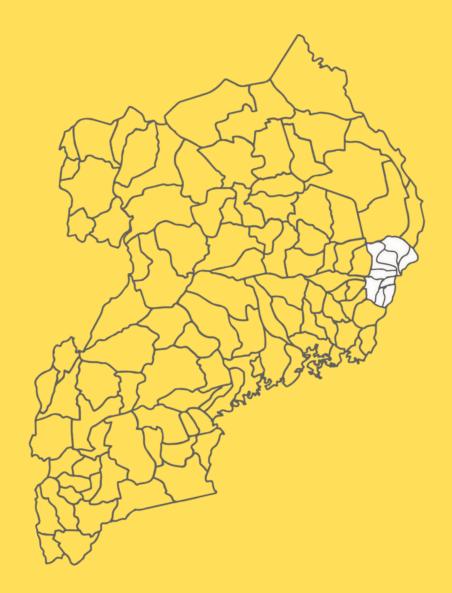

# **Empowering to Drive Change**

### **Context and Background**

According to research by Albinism Umbrella, one of Uganda's leading organisations advocating for the rights of people with albinism, the country has around 8,000 people with albinism, most of them without access to specialised care. More than 81% are under 30 years old, and only 2% live beyond 60, a life expectancy gap that highlights the extreme vulnerability of this population. In a country with only six dermatologists for 46 million inhabitants, early diagnosis is nearly impossible — meaning that most patients only seek medical help when lesions are already in advanced stages.

Beyond Suncare began its work in Bugisu, a mountainous and hard-to-reach region with one of the highest concentrations of people with albinism in the country, in 2022. Our programme, developed in collaboration with the Elgon Foundation for People with Albinism (EFPA) and the Source of the Nile Union of Persons with Albinism (SNUPA), now includes 395 registered participants — a 53% increase since the beginning of activities in the area.

### **Prevention and Access to Sun Protection**

In 2024, three rounds of mobile clinics were organised across the nine districts of Bugisu where we operate.

During these sessions, 1,609 units of UMOZI MAX sunscreen were distributed to 395 people (49% men, 51% women). Among them, 62% were children and adolescents under 18.

Medical follow-ups showed that sunburn cases dropped by 42.3%, while healthy skin conditions improved by 24.4% since the programme began. Towards the end of the year, a slight relapse was detected, underlining the importance of maintaining ongoing education, sunscreen distribution and clinical follow-up to ensure sustainable results.

Regarding actinic keratosis, an initial improvement was observed, although overall prevalence increased — linked to improved detection capacity due to a greater number of trained specialists.



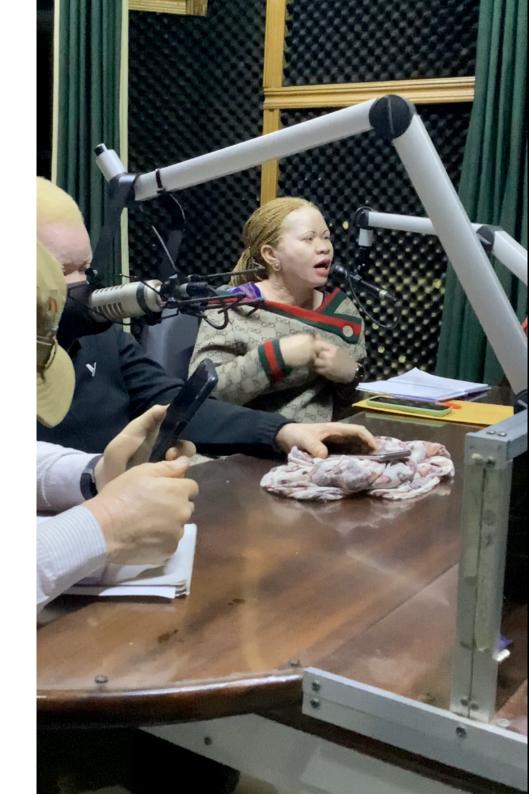


## **Partnerships for Action**

Thanks to the joint work with EFPA and SNUPA, and the support of the CRODA Foundation, 20 skin cancer surgeries were carried out in 2024. Ten of these operations took place in December, driven by the efforts of our Beyond Suncare US branch, which helped provide long-awaited treatment to patients who had been on hold for months. All diagnosed cases were basal cell carcinoma, mainly in areas highly exposed to sunlight. These interventions restored health, safety and a renewed sense of life to the people affected

## **Training and Awareness**

Continuous strengthening of local knowledge and capacity was another key pillar of our action. A total of **90 healthcare professionals** — including doctors, nurses and community health workers — took part in the clinics, applying the knowledge gained from previous training on early diagnosis, photoprotection and clinical management of albinism. Their specialisation and commitment ensure that this care becomes integrated into the public health network, remaining sustainable beyond the project itself. Awareness was equally crucial: EFPA produced four community radio programmes, reaching thousands of listeners with information about albinism, discrimination risks, skin cancer prevention and correct sun protection practices.





# **Challenges and Outlook**

The main challenge in Uganda remains expanding national coverage within a context of limited resources. The demand for dermatological care among people with albinism far exceeds current capacity, and regular access to sunscreen remains a critical need.

In 2025, our objective is to expand the number of clinics to new regions, while strengthening collaboration with health authorities and civil society organisations to ensure more people with albinism can access the care they need.

To achieve this, we will prioritise training new healthcare professionals and building strategic partnerships to ensure medium-term sustainability and progressive integration of this model into national public health policies.

# Consolidating to Endure

## **Context and Background**

Malawi is the country in Sub-Saharan Africa where, since 2014, the majority of human rights violations against people with albinism have been reported – accounting for 25% of all cases on the continent. Myths and superstitions surrounding the condition lead to abandonment at birth and violence. Daily discrimination, fear and poverty restrict their opportunities and reinforce social exclusion.

However, their greatest enemy is the sun: 90% of people with albinism die of skin cancer before the age of 30. The lack of specialists severely limits healthcare in the country: there are only two qualified dermatologists for more than 19 million inhabitants.

Since 2020, Beyond Suncare, in partnership with the Association of People with Albinism in Malawi (APAM), the Ministry of Health, and other stakeholders, has been implementing the Skin Cancer Prevention Programme. Today, this programme operates in all 28 districts of the country, becoming a national benchmark in public health and social inclusion.

## **Prevention and Access to Sun Protection**

In 2024, the programme consolidated its work through 480 dermatology clinics in hospitals and health centres across the 28 districts. As a result, 2,321 people with albinism received regular medical care. In addition, 16,592 UMOZI MAX sunscreens and wide-brimmed hats were distributed, ensuring continuous access to adapted sun protection.

Alongside healthcare, the clinics offered community education on the condition, self-care practices and early detection of lesions — strengthening skin cancer prevention and helping to reduce the social stigma that has historically surrounded albinism.

The impact was remarkable: over 70% of beneficiaries improved their sun protection practices, and 90% reported greater self-confidence and awareness of their health. This evolution demonstrates how prevention, when accompanied by proximity and continuity, can transform quality of life.

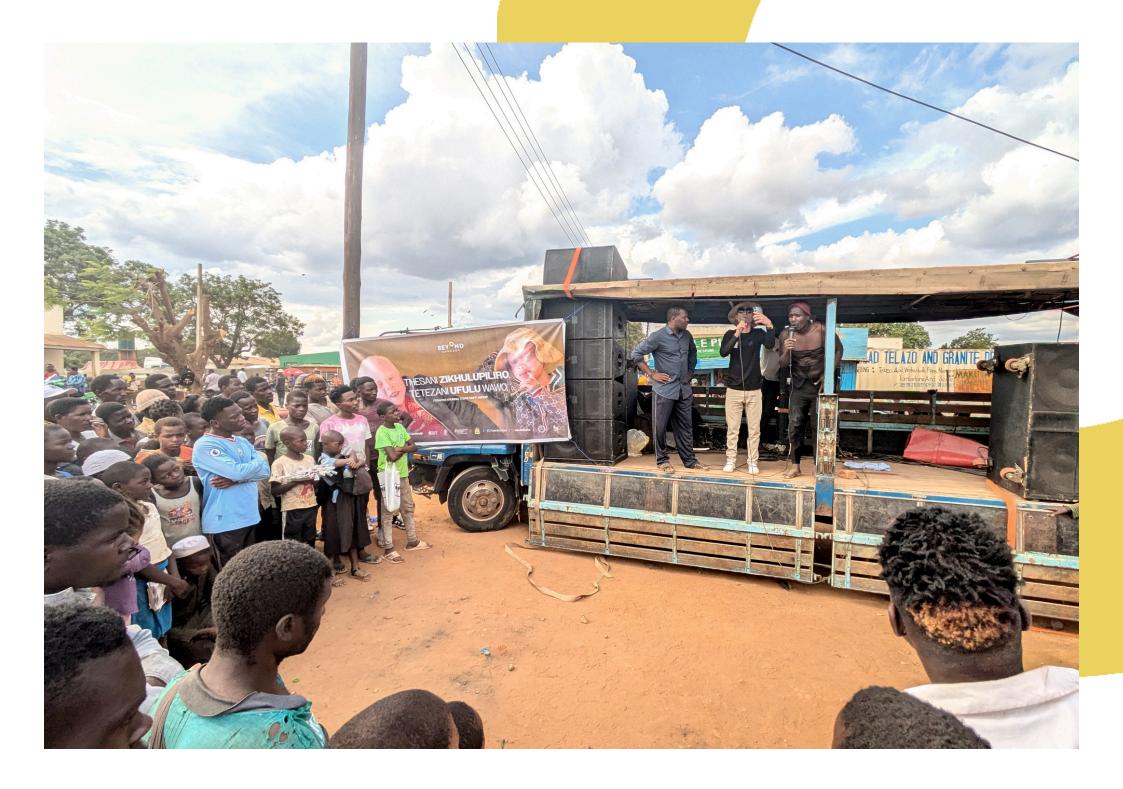
## **Partnerships for Action**

In 2024, we strengthened collaboration with four key local partners: MOHDEVS, which supports vulnerable communities; YONECO, which works for the empowerment of young people and women and the protection of children; MACODA, an organisation defending the rights of people with disabilities; and UPD, which promotes inclusion and equal opportunities. These partnerships made it possible to extend the reach of our activities, encourage the exchange of knowledge and experiences, and increase the overall impact of our work.

## **Training and Awareness**

In 2024, 88 healthcare professionals from six districts took part in specialised training on albinism, improving their knowledge in diagnosis and photoprotection by 32%. This was complemented by continuous training for the country's 36 dermatology and venereology officers, key actors in the early detection and referral of complex cases. This training was carried out during an event in Mponela (Dowa), aimed at updating professionals on the latest practices and advances in the treatment of dermatological conditions. At the same time, awareness-raising activities reached over 27,700 people through community radio programmes theatre caravans. participation in the International Albinism Awareness Day in Rumphi. These initiatives strengthened prevention efforts and helped reduce stigma.







In Malawi, community theatre has proven to be a powerful tool to raise awareness and mobilise communities.

Through our partnership with Pace for Social Change, we use popular drama as a vehicle to deliver messages about skin cancer prevention, self-care and the rights of people with albinism.

These performances not only inform but also inspire dialogue, challenge harmful beliefs and promote greater social inclusion, becoming a true engine for collective transformation.



# **Challenges and Outlook**

The main challenge remains to guarantee equitable access to prevention and treatment of skin cancer for all people with albinism living in Malawi's different regions.

Many beneficiaries, with limited financial resources, must walk long distances to reach the clinics, which restricts regular attendance. Therefore, in 2025, we will continue to work towards decentralising healthcare, bringing it closer to the homes of people with albinism.

Another major objective is for the Skin Cancer Prevention Programme to become self-managed in the long term. For this reason, we continued to promote a proposal for local production of UMOZI MAX sunscreen.

To achieve this goal, greater commitment from government authorities is needed. Hence, in 2025, we plan to focus more on political advocacy, strengthening national health guarantees and achieving a systemic and sustainable impact for people with albinism in the long term.

In the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), the incidence of albinism combines with serious health deficiencies in the country, placing these people in a situation of high vulnerability marked by discrimination, poverty and the lack of public policies that protect their rights. The absence of state programmes and specialised dermatological services leaves people with albinism without protection, meaning that skin lesions progress without diagnosis until they become serious cancers, causing dozens of deaths every year.

It is estimated that more than 18,000 people with albinism live in the country, with greater concentration in the regions of Kasai and Tshopo, where consanguinity is more frequent. Since 2021, we have been collaborating with Corbetta Foundation DRC, a Congolese organisation that leads assistance to this group and works in four areas: in the capital, Kisangani (Tshopo), since 2014; in Kinshasa since 2021; and in Mbujimayi and Tshikapa (Kasai) since 2022.

## **Prevention and Access to Photoprotection**

In 2024, 198 people with albinism were assisted in Kinshasa and 234 in Tshikapa through six clinical sessions that offered medical check-ups, follow-up of skin lesions and the distribution of 480 units of UMOZI MAX.

Throughout the DRC, access to sunscreen is very limited, not only because of the scarcity of this product in the country but above all due to the extremely high selling price for a population that is mostly without resources. Furthermore, the creams available on the market are often not suitable for the skin of people with albinism in Sub-Saharan Africa.

The clinical sessions also allowed people with albinism from both areas to create support networks, share their daily challenges and increase their self-esteem by dismantling deep-rooted beliefs in the region..



## **Clinical Results**

The clinical sessions made it possible to detect and treat a significant number of skin lesions. In total, 124 actinic keratoses were diagnosed and treated with cryotherapy, 48 additional treatments were provided, and 35 minor surgeries were performed due to suspected skin cancer.

Unfortunately, 15 people with skin cancer died due to very advanced cancers. Thanks to the joint work with local professionals and the coordination of Corbetta Foundation DRC, these actions ensured healthcare in a context of great limitations.

## **Education and Awareness**

Education and awareness formed an essential part of the intervention. All the people assisted received guidance on the condition, photoprotection and mechanisms for the prevention of skin cancer during the sessions, after which evaluation questionnaires were distributed and collected.

These evaluations showed a very positive assessment of the clinics and the messages transmitted. These actions helped to strengthen the confidence and social positioning of people with albinism in their communities.





## **Challenges and Outlook**

The project in the Democratic Republic of the Congo is our youngest programme and continues to expand, focusing mainly on the distribution of sunscreens and support for people with albinism through basic clinical consultations.

The main challenges it faces are the lack of local production of liquid nitrogen, the shortage of medical equipment for cryotherapy treatments, the difficulty faced by people with albinism living in remote areas to access the clinics, and the lack of adequate health infrastructure for the care and treatment of the beneficiaries.

Looking ahead to 2025, Beyond Suncare and Corbetta Foundation DRC plan to strengthen their fundraising actions to consolidate the current activities and, if possible, expand coverage to other areas, ensuring the free distribution of UMOZI MAX to all those who need it.

Our current reach, although limited, represents the only opportunity for regular access to photoprotection and basic medical care for many people with albinism.

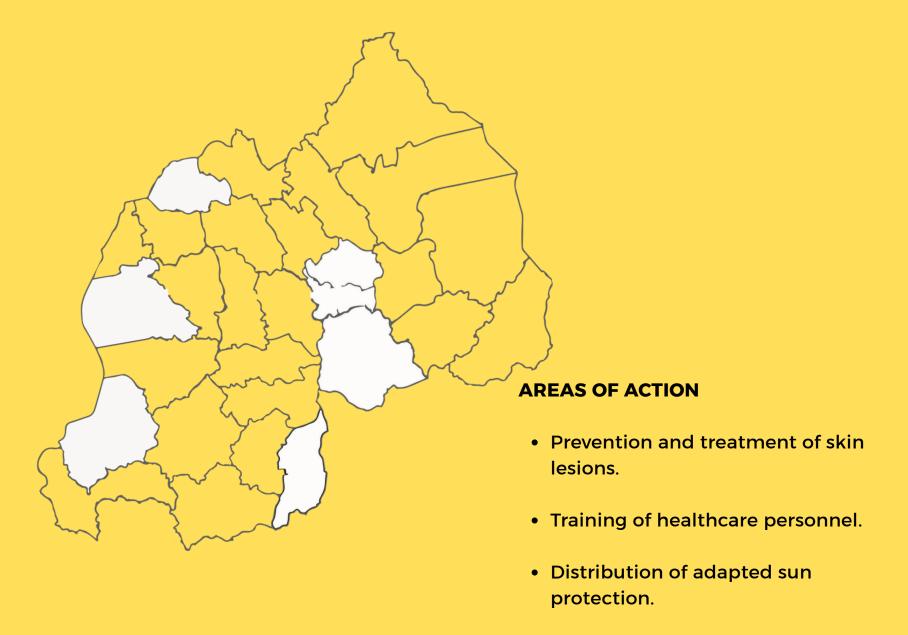

# Comprehensive care to heal

## **Context and Background**

In Rwanda, people with albinism continue to face marked health and social vulnerability.

Constant exposure to the sun, together with the lack of specialised services and adequate sunscreens, alarmingly increases the risk of skin cancer — the main cause of mortality among this group in Sub-Saharan Africa — in a country where there are only nine dermatologists, all of them concentrated in Kigali, far from rural communities. Added to this are discrimination and stigma, which hinder school, work and community integration, with an especially serious impact on women and children.

Since 2020, Beyond Suncare has worked together with Health Alert Organization (HAO) to reverse this situation, developing a model that combines prevention, medical care and awareness-raising. Thanks to this partnership, albinism has become part of the national health and human rights agenda, although there is still no specific plan to support these people.

## **Prevention and Access to Sun Protection**

During 2024, seven annual mobile clinics were organised in the seven district hospitals of Gisenyi, Gisagara, Kirehe, Rutsiro, Kicukiro, Bugesera and Nyamasheke.

In these, **454 people with albinism were treated, of whom 217 were minors**. Throughout these clinics, 1,362 containers of UMOZI MAX were distributed, sufficient for six months of use, in addition to wide-brimmed hats in the Kirehe district.

All the people attended were examined by healthcare personnel and received practical guidance on sun protection and self-care habits. These clinics not only provided medical care but also a space for support that allowed families to feel accompanied in the prevention of skin cancer for their loved ones.





## **Clinical Results**

The consultations made it possible to detect a total of 76 cases of actinic keratosis, all treated by cryotherapy, and to register 56 patients with severe burns for follow-up.

In addition, Beyond Suncare and Health Alert Organization supported the performance of two reconstructive surgeries for women with advanced tumours, in coordination with professionals from referral hospitals. These interventions restored health and wellbeing to the patients and highlighted the importance of early detection.

## **Training and Awareness**

The strengthening of the health system was another axis of the programme. In 2024, 40 nurses from Kirehe and Gisagara (23 of them women) participated in three-day workshops on albinism, photoprotection and early diagnosis. This training, which combined theory and practice, made it possible to improve their clinical skills by 36%, increasing the response capacity in local health centres.

At the same time, each clinic included educational sessions with patients and families, focused on self-care and prevention, applying the MVURA NKUVURE ("Treat me and I will treat you") methodology, which promotes community healing and the exchange of experiences, strengthening protection habits and promoting social inclusion.





## **Challenges and Outlook**

In Rwanda, the main challenge remains the shortage of dermatological specialists, since there are only nine professionals in the entire country. This limitation reduces our capacity to respond to advanced cases and makes it essential to constantly strengthen the training of first-level healthcare personnel in early detection and care.

Looking ahead to 2025, Rwanda has been identified as a particularly suitable context to pilot a macro-level strategy. Its manageable geographic size, the relative stability of its health system and the ongoing commitment of Health Alert Organization to this issue make it an ideal setting to test and refine scalable interventions aimed at achieving systemic and sustainable change for people with albinism.









When my twin daughters with albinism were born, my husband and my own family turned their backs on me. I experienced immense loneliness, but thanks to the support of a community group, I found the strength to transform pain into hope. Today, together with Nicole and Nikita, I celebrate life through fashion and music.

My story is that of many women in Rwanda: a path of resilience towards a fairer and more inclusive future.

In 2024, we took key steps in innovation, partnerships and international projection that strengthened the sustainability of our programmes. From promoting local production to geographic expansion and new strategic alliances, these actions consolidated a comprehensive model that transforms lives today and opens future paths for people with albinism.

# Other Notable Actions

# Innovation in Local Production

In 2024, progress continued towards the local production of UMOZI MAX in Malawi, with the presentation of a proposal to Kamuzu Central Hospital and the Ministry of Health. The project remains in a preliminary phase and pending government commitment, but represents a key step to guarantee, in the future, the sustainability of access to adapted sunscreens in a country with one of the highest solar incidences in the world.

# Expansion and Joining Forces

This year we expanded our reach beyond the countries where we work with the distribution of 500 units of UMOZI MAX in Zimbabwe, in collaboration with Alive Albinism Initiative. At the same time, we promoted political dialogue in Uganda, Malawi and Rwanda to ensure the inclusion of albinism in national health policies. Finally, we signed agreements with various entities in Malawi, incorporating civil society organisations in the defence of the rights of people with albinism.

# National and International Projection

The year was marked by the opening of new locations. In May, we registered in the United States the Beyond Suncare Albinism Network, based in North Carolina, and, in parallel, opened a branch in Donostia-San Sebastián. Both openings strengthen our capacity for advocacy, awareness-raising and fundraising in Europe and America, thus expanding the global projection of our work.

# Solidarity Alliances

In 2024, we had the support of social entities and companies such as Farmamoda, Parafina and Masikini, whose commitment made it possible to provide more resources to our beneficiaries and give greater visibility to our mission. These collaborations show how the involvement of committed brands can enhance our impact through donations, logistical support and dissemination, reaching more people.



We understand communication as a fundamental pillar to give visibility to the reality of albinism in Sub-Saharan Africa and to raise awareness among both local and international audiences.

Through campaigns, testimonies and advocacy spaces, we bring a reality that is often distant closer, with the aim of mobilising support and generating commitment.

We participate in international forums, expert debates and community meetings that strengthen our advocacy capacity. Each story and each action thus become an opportunity to awaken empathy and create a global support network for our mission.



# Scope and Impact

# **Communicating to Raise Awareness**

Our objective of raising awareness among the general public is reflected in actions that bring the reality of albinism closer to different audiences. Through educational posts on our social media, we show the challenges faced by people with albinism, especially in Africa, and how we support them to overcome them. In addition, our participation in specialised forums allows us to share the experience and learning acquired in the field in key areas such as health, education and pharmacy, combining digital communication and the dissemination of technical knowledge to generate awareness and promote inclusion.

## **Media Appearances**

In 2024, we strengthened our presence in regional, national and international media, consolidating our voice as a reference in health and the rights of people with albinism. The press and television echoed our work on 15 occasions through interviews, reports and articles that highlighted the impact of our interventions and how we support communities to overcome the challenges they face. This visibility represented public recognition that encouraged more people to join our cause.

### **Digital Channels**

In 2024, our presence on social media grew significantly. Our community on Instagram increased by 142%, with 65 posts focused on impact and awareness. We consolidated Facebook and Instagram as our main communication channels and used LinkedIn to connect with strategic allies, publishing 14 posts about partnerships and institutional work. Although Spain continues to account for the majority of our audience (68.6%), followed by the United States, Brazil, the United Kingdom and Argentina, these results strengthen our projection for the future.

### **Events and Awareness**

In 2024, we strengthened our presence in various spaces that gave visibility to the cause of albinism. A highlight was the participation of Mafalda Soto, our founder, in the Doers Talks in Málaga, where she shared Beyond Suncare's experience in the prevention of skin cancer and social inclusion in Africa, bringing our work closer to new audiences. We also took part in forums and debates with experts in health and human rights, which facilitated the exchange of good practices and positioned our model as an innovative reference. These activities broadened Beyond Suncare's public reach and reinforced awareness among participants.

# **Award and Grants**

In 2024 we were recognised and supported by leading entities in health, international cooperation and corporate social responsibility. These awards and grants make our impact possible, allowing us to consolidate our programmes for prevention and dermatological care in Africa.

We received the support of key institutions and foundations, among them the Government of the Balearic Islands, the ADEY Foundation, the La Caixa Foundation, the International League of Dermatological Societies (ILDS), the CRODA Foundation, the Barceló Foundation, the África Directo Foundation, and the Spanish Association of Paediatrics. 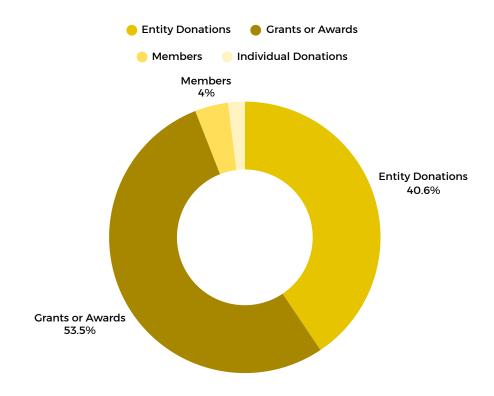
In this way, we strengthen the trust of our partners and ensure the sustainability and integrity of our programmes for the benefit of people with albinism.



# Income 2024

In 2024, Beyond Suncare reached an income of €392,720.82, representing a 64% increase compared to 2023. This growth was made possible thanks to the support of international entities, foundations and public institutions, which contributed 41% of the total. Grants and awards constituted the main source of funding (54%), reflecting the confidence in the solidity and credibility of our intervention model.

In addition, contributions from members (4%) and individual donors (2%) reinforced the value of citizen support. The combination of major institutional contributions and individual donations diversified income sources, strengthening the sustainability of our programmes.

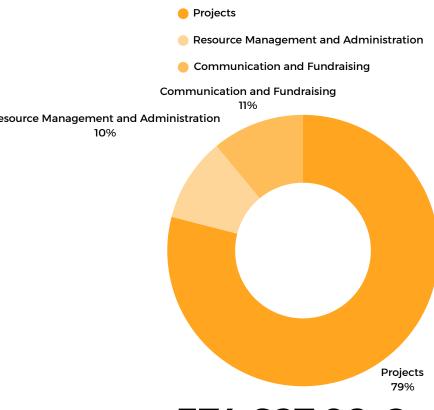
Growth of 64% compared with 2023



# Expenses 2024

Expenses in 2024 amounted to €374,627.98, an increase of 49% compared to the previous year, in line with the expansion of our activities in Africa. The majority (79%) was allocated directly to the execution of programmes and active projects, ensuring the implementation of dermatological clinics, the distribution of sunscreens and awareness-raising activities in the four countries where we work.

10% was invested in management and administration, ensuring efficient and transparent use of the funds received. Finally, 11% was devoted to communication and fundraising, key to giving visibility to our cause, strengthening awareness and mobilising new institutional and corporate partnerships. This distribution shows that Beyond Suncare's priority is direct action for the benefit of people with albinism, without neglecting transparency or financial sustainability.

Each medical consultation represents a person accessing quality care in places where such services did not exist before; each distributed sunscreen bottle means a real possibility to prevent skin cancer; each trained professional multiplies the reach of the impact by carrying knowledge back to their community; and each surgical intervention restores health, peace of mind and a future to people with albinism and their families.

In 2024, thanks to the trust of our partners and the commitment of communities, we reached more people than ever. These results demonstrate that when efforts are united, it is possible to break the cycle of exclusion and move towards a fairer, safer and fuller life for people with albinism.
